It's that time of year again when exhausted Ridgewood High School (RHS) parents and their children are talking nonstop about Jamboree. Teenagers and younger children can't wait to see their own parents and those of friends on stage doing what adults do best embarrassing themselves and their offspring.

As wonderful as that can be, the best thing about the musical show called Jamboree is that it's a huge source of scholarship money for Ridgewood High School graduates, organizers said.

"In the past seven years, we've given out over \$600,000 in scholarships," noted Bill DiModugno, who is a producer along with Alane Steinacker and Rob Goodgold. The annual show has been going strong since 1947. DiModugno is a 1980 RHS graduate who considers Jamboree an integral part of Ridgewood. Although his parents never performed on stage, his mother helped with fund-raising. When his older sister started performing in Jamboree several years ago, DiModugno was hooked and couldn't wait for his own children to reach high school age. Now he has a senior and freshman at RHS as well as a sixth-grader, so he'll be able to participate for many more

This year's theme is "That's Life" - family, work, community and love.

To the accompaniment of a live band and music tracks, the dancers and singers bring the subjects to life. For the work theme, the song "9 to 5" represents the doldrums, while "Five O'Clock World" by The Vogues is about the fun that can follow a work day. The "Razzle Dazzle" number from the musical "Chicago" features a big courtroom scene in a "shout out" to all the attorneys in the cast.

A spoof on Fleet Week in New York City is part of the community theme. For love, songs include the show-stopping rendition of Lady Gaga's "Bad Romance."

"The Gaga number is absolutely spectacular," DiModugno said. "You see these moms up there on stage who are so amazing they could be in the real Gaga video."

That's high praise coming from a producer who is a theater professional. DiModugno has produced shows in New York City and now has a company that specializes in setting up out-of-town tours for other Broadway shows.

"We have more than 90 people in the cast and we're having a blast," he said. "Once it's over, you can't wait for the next one to start."

Jamboree 2011 will be performed at 8 p.m. tonight and 7 p.m. on Saturday. Tickets can be purchased at the door. For more information, visit rhsjamboree.com.
